



St Bartholomew's CE Primary School serves the Penn area of Wolverhampton. It currently has 420 children on roll (including a 30-place Nursery), with approximately 12% of children eligible for free school meals. The school enjoys a diverse community, with over 60% of children coming from ethnic minority groups. One and a half form entry (45) results in some mixed age classes across KS2. Due to the popularity of the school, the LA funded bulge classes of 60 children across two years. This expansion has now been made permanent and the school has a new PAN of 60 children per year group. This school has been judged to be 'outstanding' (Ofsted 2009, 2014 and 2024). St. Bart's is a Strategic Partner in the Wolverhampton, Walsall and South Staffordshire Manor Teaching School Hub. In addition to successful Ofsted judgements, the school was also judged to be 'outstanding/excellent' in 2009, 2014 and 2019 during SIAMS Inspections.

It is a high performing, flourishing and happy school, with close links to St. Bartholomew's Church, that continues to go from strength to strength. The school has been listed in the Sunday Times Top 300 Schools consistently for the last ten years, based on national outcomes. Attainment measures in 2024 were significantly above national figures and placed the school in the top 5% of schools nationally and at the top of Wolverhampton's Local Authority DfE league tables.



St Benedict Biscop CE Primary School joined the Trust in December 2016. The school serves the Wombourne area of South Staffordshire and is situated in the village. It currently has 210 children on roll (30 per year group), plus a 26-place Nursery, which offers 30 hours provision. It is a very happy and caring one-form entry school, with excellent behaviour for learning and children who are polite, interested, and courteous. The school has 16% disadvantaged children. St. Benedict Biscop is well supported and valued by parents and is closely linked to St Benedict Biscop Church.

St Benedict Biscop joined us as a sponsor school, having been graded as 'inadequate' during its Ofsted inspection, with attainment and progress placing them in the bottom 10% of all schools nationally. In 2023, the school was graded as 'good', with Leadership and Management, Early Years, Personal Development and Behaviour and Attitudes all judged to be 'outstanding'; impact of the Trust was also praised within the report. The school also had a successful SIAMS inspection in May 2024, concluding that the school is living up to its foundations as a church school. Outcomes in 2024 reflect progress that is significantly above national figures.





Woodfield Primary School (originally Woodfield Infant School and Woodfield Junior School) is in Wolverhampton. It is a very happy, caring, vibrant and larger than average three-form entry school with good behaviour for learning and amazing, delightful children who are polite, interested, inquisitive and courteous. The school has an above average (33%) percentage of disadvantaged children and enjoys a diverse community, with 75% coming from minority ethnic groups. The percentage of children who speak English as an additional language is well above national averages at nearly 30%. This is a delightful school that is flourishing in all aspects of school life.

The two original schools joined St Bartholomew's CE MAT as sponsored schools in September 2017. The schools amalgamated in September 2019 to form Woodfield Primary School. Since joining the Trust, there have been significant improvements in all areas. The school was judged to be 'outstanding' in March 2024.



All Saints' CE Primary School serves the rural village area of Trysull, on the outskirts of South Staffordshire. It is a joyful, caring, smaller than average school with 0.5 form entry, resulting in four mixed aged classes across the school. The behaviour for learning is consistently good and the delightful children are polite, dynamic, and inspiring. The school has an average percentage of disadvantaged pupils (21%) and has strong links with All Saints' Church. Since joining the Trust, All Saints' outcomes have improved significantly. Progress and attainment are now above national figures and pupils continue to flourish.

The school was judged as 'good' by Ofsted in January 2023 and St. Bart's Trust was identified as providing both exceptional and effective support in the report.



Haughton St. Giles Primary School serves the village of Haughton in Staffordshire. This smaller than average primary school consists of four mixed age classes. Behaviour for learning is at least good and the fantastic children in the school continue to make us proud. The school has 13% disadvantaged pupils. The school was judged as 'good' by Ofsted in 2023 and the impact of Trust leadership was praised. Outcomes in 2024 reflected significant improvements, and attainment that is significantly above national figures. The school also sits at the top of the Staffordshire Council DfE league tables for attainment in 2024.





Gnosall St. Lawrence Primary School serves the village of Gnosall in Staffordshire. This 1.5 form entry school is a flourishing school that nurtures and develops its children in all aspects of school life. There are 19% disadvantaged pupils in the school. Ofsted graded the school as 'good' in 2023 and the impact of Trust leadership and support was praised. Outcomes in 2024 place the school in the top 20% nationally.



Woodseaves Primary School is a smaller than average primary school situated in the village of Woodseaves, Staffordshire. There are 90 children on roll in this 0.5 entry school, resulting in four mixed aged classes across the school. There are 20% disadvantaged pupils in the school. The school was judged to be 'good' in October 2023. Significant support has been implemented and the delightful children and staff are now flourishing across the school. This is reflected in outcomes at the end of 2024, which are now significantly above national figures. The school also ranks second on Staffordshire Council's DfE league tables in 2024.



Oak Meadow is a larger than average primary school situated on the outskirts of Wolverhampton, in the ward of Wednesfield North. The school serves mainly the large social housing estate of Ashmore Park. It is currently oversubscribed, with a pupil roll of 424, serving National Curriculum years, Reception to Year 6. In July 2023, Oak Meadow was awarded 'Primary School of the Year 2023' at the prestigious Education Awards.

Oak Meadow is a high performing school, as evidenced by outcomes that are significantly above national figures. The school ranked second in Wolverhampton Local Authority DfE league tables for 2024. The school was judged to be 'good' in 2020.





Fairhaven Primary School is situated in the village of Wordsley on the western edge of the Dudley borough. It was opened in September 1969, accommodating up to 220 pupils. The school was later extended and facilities improved, with its PAN being raised from 36 to 45 to accommodate up to 315 children. Currently, there are 285 pupils on roll. In addition, in September 2020 our Nursery opened to accommodate children aged 3 and 4. The school was judged to be Requires Improvement in 2018 and 2021.



Christ Church CE Primary School joined the Trust on 1st January 2025 and serves the North Walsall Ward of Walsall, sitting on the border between Leamore and Blakenall. Due to two expansions, it currently has 450 pupils, including a 30 place Nursery, which currently offers 30 hour provision. Fifty percent of pupils at Christ Church are entitled to Free School Meals and twenty five percent are classed as having a Special Educational Need. Due to the good work of the school within Special Needs, it has opened two 'Specialist Resource Provisions' for children with Social, Emotional and Mental Health needs. In its most recent Ofsted Inspection (March 2023), Christ Church was graded as 'Good' across all areas.

Christ Church is a very happy, loving, nurturing and highly inclusive school where pupils thrive and staff always go 'the extra mile'.
